


Fig 3. Volunteers from BAME (Black, Asian and minority ethnic communities) and White backgrounds (versus 36% local population)




Fig 4. Age Structure of volunteers (%)




Fig 5. 2018/19 volunteer hours: 13,679 (blue) versus 4 year average: 9972 (red)

Policy for Legacy and other Reserve Funds

Background

In 2009 our founder, Bobby de Joia left £50,000 in her will to Heath Hands, with no restrictions. Most of this is unused. With other funds, financial reserves at 31 December 2016 were approximately £70,000, held in two deposit accounts with Scottish Widows and Charities Aid Foundation (CAF) Bank. The most appropriate use of the funds was discussed at Trustee meetings on 16 November 2016 and 11 January 2017, and it was agreed to develop this Reserves Policy.

Discussion

The debate was between keeping 'rainy day' money against potential future risks, and using it soon to enhance the Heath. Both were accepted as valid uses. Trustees felt that some of Bobby's legacy should be used for specific identifiable projects.

Potential risks were identified as the withdrawal of the substantial benefits in kind provided to us by English Heritage (the lease of the Dairy) and the Corporation of London (CoL) (secondment of the Projects and Volunteer Manager (PVM)). Both of these arrangements expire in 2020.

Trustees favoured a prudent approach, that is, to retain a fairly large reserve against risk; but to use the remainder over the next three years, through to 31 March 2020, the period covered by our Strategic Plan.

Heath Hands will keep enough reserves to cover running costs for three years, and a sum of £35,000 against the risk of losing the above benefits in kind.

Conclusion

Heath Hands will hold £15,000 as 3 years running costs, and £35,000 against risks specified above, with the remainder intended to be used for identified projects meeting Heath Hands' objectives by 31 March 2020. This policy will be reflected in the Strategic Plan.
